1	<p>Accurate Author: Nice jacket!</p> <p>Author: No!</p> <p>Accurate Author: But the book just isn't well researched. Got any notes? Sources? Acknowledgements?</p> <p>Voice Over Accurate Author: Sources are evidence of accuracy and attention to detail. Authors are eager to share their research process and provide their notes to add to their credibility. This may include primary sources such as historical journals or diary entries, museum reproductions or newspaper articles from the time period, quotes, interviews, and even photographs. Many authors' gain first-hand experience through travel and special expeditions. Good authors demonstrate their works are well researched by citing their sources and acknowledging experts who help them.</p>
2	<p>Author: Accurate Author? Let me see some identification.</p> <p>Accurate Author: Quiet, you! I'm asking the questions. Why are you so defensive? What, are you biased?</p> <p>Voice Over Accurate Author: Personal interests, experiences, and the author's passion can create writing that is interesting to the reader. But when an author's bias, or personal opinion creeps in, it may narrow the presentation of information. They may leave out ideas or opinions that conflict with their own. So, it is important to recognize that authors may have different perspectives on a topic.</p>
