1	Skylar:	Oh, you've got to be kidding me. Bo Peep? I'm filing a complaint about this outfit. Well, it seems this time I've jumped into a Mother Goose rhyme. Where the likes of Little Miss Muffet, Georgie Porgie, ol' Jack Sprat, and Humpty Dumpty have entertained children for hundreds of years. I wish he'd get it together.
2	Skylar:	Like all folklore, we do not know exactly when or where the Mother Goose rhymes began or if there was a Mother Goose. What we are certain of is that the literary term "Mother Goose" came from Charles Perrault's 1697 publication of fairy tales. But now they're most often associated with nursery rhymes.
3	Skylar:	The rhymes are pretty simple in origin and may have even started out as a way to teach children to count, learn the alphabet, memorize the days of the week, or to share important customs and beliefs.
4	Skylar:	A tell tale characteristics of Mother Goose rhymes is a distinct rhythm or beat that stresses certain sounds and intonation. Hickory, dickory, dock, The mouse went up the clock. The clock struck one, The mouse ran down. Hickory, dickory, dock. The rhythm strengthens the reader or listener's sense of language. They also use imaginative
		words and ideas, which spark creativity and stretch the imagination. Hey diddle, diddle, The cat and the fiddle, The cow jumped over the moon; The little dog laughed To see such sport, And the dish ran away with the spoon.
		Mother Goose rhymes have compact structures, which quickly establish the scene and reveal the plot all at once. An entire story can unfold in as few as four lines. Jack Sprat could eat no fat, His wife could eat no lean, And so between the both, you see, They licked the platter clean.

		The most recognizable characteristic of Mother Goose rhymes is the use of wit and whimsy. Jack be nimble, Jack be quick, Jack jump over the candlestick.
5	Skylar:	Mother Goose or similar verses have been told to children around the world. The phrases, nonsense words, alliteration, rhythms, and repetitions help children learn to segment words, an important pre-reading skill. The characters, themes, and structures become the foundation of literary education.
6	Skylar:	So check out Mother Goose. Like all folklore, it is so closely tied to cultures, countries, and value systems, that it is shelved in nonfiction. You can find them in the 398s at your local library. Okay, now is there supposed to be a flock of sheep around here somewhere? Ah, there they are!
