Plot is a combination of Conflict and Pattern of Action.

Conflict—When a character faces a problem or obstacle that stands in the way of achieving his/her goal.

Pattern of Action—The structure of a story chosen by an author as the best way of telling his/her story. Review each of the types of conflict and patterns of action presented in the video.
