Scene		Full Transcript
1	Cali:	(to skeleton) Did you know you have 26 bones in your foot?
		Oh, hey, what's up? It's Cali! The guys and I are just studying for an anatomy quiz. I hope you're enjoying this episode of Thinking Aloud! It's part of the series on Nonfiction Text Structure.
2	Cali:	I used to get hung up when I read, but of the things that helped me was learning to be aware of nonfiction text structure. It's the skeleton, or framework, that authors use to organize their message when writing nonfiction text.
	Voice Over Graphic Cali:	Just by recognizing it, my thinking became more organized, my comprehension improved, and I could remember the authors' main points. I find that I use all sorts of text structures, and now, my writing is better organized, too!
3	Cali:	When you watch these videos you're already ahead of most boneheads, who aren't even aware that authors use nonfiction text structure to help readers better understand the information.
		Without it, reading just falls apart.
		So check out the videos on text structure and improve your reading and writing.
